# eNovation A: Playing on the Black Keys

### eNovation A Overview

Goals	<b>Summary:</b> This eNovation introduces the topography of the piano keyboard through a variety of activities on the black keys. Developing a steady pulse is essential to successful completion of the drills and applications in this unit, most of which may be performed either with a partner, in a group, or with a play-along audio track.		
Key Elements:	<ul> <li>Posture at the Piano</li> <li>Finger Numbers</li> <li>Keyboard Topography: The Two- and Three-Black Key Groups</li> <li>Pulse and Tempo</li> <li>Counting Basic Rhythms (whole, half, and quarter notes and rests)</li> <li>Dynamics: <i>forte 'f'</i> and <i>piano 'p'</i></li> </ul>		
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#### *Topic 1: Posture at the Piano / Keyboard Topography - The Black Keys / Finger Numbers*

Lesson Overview				
	In this lesson, students will become familiar with the topography of the keyboard, and learn how the fingers are numbered. Aural understanding of up/down/repeat on the keyboard is introduced.

In these. examples you will be asked to determine the direction of the melody – Does it go up, down, or is the note repeated? Practice with the audio file until you can accurately play the example. Tip: It really helps if you can accurately sing what you hear before attempting to play.	



## *Topic 2: Rhythm: Pulse and Tempo / Counting Note Values*

Lesson Overview		
In this lesson, students learn the concept of steady pulse and learn non-metrical counting of basic rhythms.		
Developing a steady pulse is among the most essential of skills. Students should practice with the play-

### Topic 3: Playing and Reading on the Black Keys / Dynamics – Loud and Soft

	Students are introduced to unstaffed reading of finger numbers and rhythms, both hands separately and hands together. Playing with loud and soft dynamics is stressed.

	Technique	<u>Finger Dexterity Drill</u>	These two drills will help you develop better technique. In the first, you will develop dexterity in playing on the strong fingers of each hand (2,3,4) using a rhythm pattern that allows for slower and faster finger motions. The second exercise is a two-handed drill that requires coordination when passing the melody from one hand to the other and back. Watch the videos in the media area before beginning to practice. Play with continuity as you move from one
