Topic 1: The Musical Alphabet / Naming the White Keys

Use your sense of touch to find different keys on the piano by referencing the two and three black-key groups. The notes drilled are grouped into "CDE" or "FGAB." Remember not to look at your hands while playing.

	Technique	Five-Finger Position	Watch the video Five-Finger Position on the White Keys. Then, practice the drill using the C major and the A minor positions.
	Listening	Aural ID: Up, Down, or Repeat? (MT.NET)	Complete the MT.NET AURAL drill.
	Listening	Aural Playback: Matching Pitch and Rhythm in 5-Finger Position (Up, Down, Repeat)	There are four audio files in each of two positions, C and A. In these examples you will be asked to determine the direction of the melody – Does it go up, down, or is the note repeated? Practice with the audio file until you can accurately play the example. Tip: It really helps if you can accurately sing what you hear before attempting to play.
	Keyboard Awareness	Keyboard Orientation Drill	The Keyboard Orientation Drill is a challenging activity combining hand and finger number drill with note and interval identification on the keyboard.
	Improvisation	<u>Creating Melodies on the White Keys -</u> In a Melancholy Mood	Create a melody using two different five- finger positions. Follow the instructions on the page to improvise your own melody. Counting is especially important in this activity. You will need to use the play-along audio track when improvising.

Topic 4: Reading and Playing in Five-Finger Positions / Legato and Staccato Touches

Students are introduced to unstaffed directional reading of AlphaNotes in five-finger position. Legato and staccato articulations are taught and are included in Reading B. Students learn the appropriate symbols for these articulations and perform accordingly. The repertoire, *Sneaky Pie*, features the staccato touch.

	Technique	Articulation Drill - Legato and Staccato	Watch the video: Articulations: Legato and Staccato The drills on this page will help you develop technique in playing legato (connected) and staccato (detached) articulations. There are three different drills and you should master all three of them: "Playing Legato," "Playing Staccato," and "Alternating Hands Playing Legato and Staccato." Watch the videos in the media area before beginning to practice. Play with continuity as you move from one hand to the next. Remember: "up" stems are for the right hand and "down" stems are for the left hand.
	Reading	Reading B: White Keys (HS)	Practice these reading drills in five-finger positions. Take care to use the required hand and fingerings and be aware of dynamics and articulations.
	Repertoire	Name That Tune!	Students learn two familiar folk tunes (one for the L.H. and one for the R.H.) and try to identify them!
	Repertoire	Easy Does It by Chan Kiat Lim (student/teacher duet)	This piece uses only the legato touch and is played with two hands. Watch the performance video (mini) to assist you with correct technique.
	Repertoire	Little Song by Chan Kiat Lim (student/teacher duet)	This piece is for the right hand and uses only the legato touch. Watch the performance video (mini) to assist you with correct technique.
	Repertoire	Sneaky Pie by Susanna Garcia	This piece is for the right hand and uses both legato and staccato touches. Watch the performance video (mini) to assist you with correct technique.
	Ensemble	The Happy Warrior by Susanna Garcia	Multiple Keyboard Ensemble (4 Players) using five-finger positions.
